A LIVING SACRIFICE

Sunday, September 3rd at 9:15am and 11:00am

There are two major holidays celebrated in Islam each year, Eid-al-Fitr (celebrating the end of the fasting month of Ramadan, occurring in early- to mid-summer) and Eid-al-Adha, a day celebrating the prophet Abraham's obedience to God's command to offer his son as a sacrifice. While the Christian narrative names this son Isaac, the Muslim narrative identifies him as Ishmael. Celebrated from August 31 to September 1, Eid-al-Adha, considered the greater of the two main Muslim holidays, is a time for reflection on the sacrifices that we might make in our own lives. And, while we will certainly not be sacrificing any humans or animals as part of our service this week, we will be reflecting on our monthly worship theme of "Growth," and what it is that we might be called to sacrifice in order that we might grow. What might we, as a community and as individuals, need to give up in order to live into who we are called to be?

This class will meet once or twice a month for eight sessions, each lasting three hours. Dates of these sessions will be determined at the organizational meeting, so bring your calendars!



THE HAUNTING CHURCH • REV. JEAN ROWE

A study group of 20-25 UUs has been meeting for 5 or 6 years using the name "Christians in Exile," a term coined by progressive Episcopal Bishop John Shelby Spong-- who said many of us are followers of Jesus but dissatisfied with the institutional Christian churches. We've read and discussed many books, some on progressive Christianity, and some on a study of compassion from a Buddhist and secular viewpoint. We've had wide-ranging topics loosely related to following Jesus' teachings.

The group was founded and led by Revs. Earle Rabb and Jean Rowe, originally to help the many new members who had joined UUTC but were disoriented because they had always been mainline Christians. We began the group with a 5 week UUA program called *The Haunting Church*...meaning a look back at the church of your earlier years that continues to shape or haunt your ideas of church. It helped us to look back and then compare and contrast aspects of being UU and one's past affiliation (or no affiliation).

It's been so long, and so many new people have joined, we are revisiting *The Haunting Church* for five sessions. ***Even if you don't plan to continue with this study group***, the five sessions stand on their own and are ***open to everyone***.

The Christians In Exile group meets on the 2nd and 4th Mondays, 3:30 to 5:00, Sept. through June, in the sanctuary. ***The Haunting Church* program meets Sept. 11 and 25, Oct. 9 and 23, and Nov. 13**. 



CHARITABLE GIVING FOR SEPTEMBER: PISGAH LEGAL SERVICES



Pisgah Legal Services is a community-based non-profit law firm providing free civil legal help to our communities' most vulnerable: the working poor, the elderly, the disabled, and victims of abuse. Roughly 1/3 of their work involves helping families and children escape domestic violence, 1/3 involves preventing homelessness, foreclosures, evictions, and helping those living in substandard housing conditions, and 1/3 involves helping people obtain affordable healthcare, helping people with disabilities get their benefits, and protecting our seniors from scams and fraud. They are the only free legal resource in Western North Carolina. In 2015, Pisgah Legal Services helped nearly 600 Transylvania County residents, including 74 cases to secure safety from domestic violence and 69 cases to address housing and consumer problems.

Bruce and Jacquelyn Rogow have been defenders of justice and supporters of Pisgah Legal for many years. They were both Legal Services lawyers in the 1960s and 1970s and remain passionate about helping disadvantaged people. The Rogows have generously funded several gift challenges that raised funds to help low-income families in Transylvania County. When thinking about the role of legal aid in WNC, Bruce said, "Poverty and Justice are, like oil and water, immiscible. Pisgah Legal Services changes the chemistry in our mountain communities." FALL PICNIC JUST AROUND THE CORNER • SEPTEMBER 10TH





I'VE SEEN THE SPONSORED PROJECTS LIST — WHAT'S A TABLE CLOSET?

Funny you should ask...

One of the most tedious and dangerous things we do around here is drag tables and chairs out of the maintenance room and into the classrooms, foyer and social hall. The maintenance room is a bit of a catch all for those many items we have that we don't have in constant use but need to be available. Like tables. Unlike chairs, we can't leave them all stacked up in the social hall, and, when we drag them out, we bump the walls, marring our paint job and bashing our fingers.

Never was the need more apparent than when Hogwarts moved on campus, and we had to stash all our chairs and nearly all our tables in order to accommodate our young people's work stations. It was not pretty. In fact, it was nearly impossible to get into the maintenance room at all.



The solution, proposed long before this summer, was to create some type of table-specific storage off of the social hall, stealing space from the front office. The footprint of the closet would need to be roughly 3 feet square, since tables can be stored on their short ends, and then slid out into the social hall. A sliding “barn-style” door that would be large enough to support our *Fall* tapestry would cover the opening without creating the need for a swinging door footprint into the space.

This solution would have the added benefit of being appropriately close to the action—rarely do we use tables in the sanctuary, where they live now. This would make the work of setting up and taking down much easier on those that regularly do it, with less chance for bodily harm.

Currently, we are collecting bids for this work so that we have an idea of what implementing this solution would cost. While this closet would be no help at all for chairs, it would free up 18 square feet of floor space in the maintenance room, making it safer for everyone who needs to access that space.

Sponsored Projects must be approved by the Board and are funded with donations that are separate from pledges.

The images to the left are UUA developed signage, available for printing as yard signs. Four-color process signs are not inexpensive, so the most economical way to acquire these will not be locally (we checked), but through the UUA-partnered printshop in Maryland.

We must order 50 of these to make the price affordable, but if we do, signs are only \$10 each.
