## SUNDAY, A WEEK FROM NOW

## CLIMATE STORIES & OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

In February, the Transylvania Natural Resource Council is co-sponsoring two events. The first, designed for local decision-makers and co-sponsored with the Chamber of Commerce and the Transylvania Economic Alliance, is on the economic impact of the outdoor recreation industry in Transylvania County. This event will be held in the classroom of the Election Center on **Friday, February 8th at 9:00am**.



The second event, co-sponsored with the library, is open to the public. **Climate Stories NC** will be held in the Rogow Room **from 6:30-8:30pm on Thursday, February 14th**. This event will be led by David Salvesen, Institute for the Environment, UNC at Chapel Hill. Stories shown are personal stories

from people all over the state of North Carolina whose lives and work have been impacted by climate change.

It is easy, based on the scale of this problem, to believe that we are helpless to protect what we love—maybe too easy. You are encouraged to attend one or both (especially if you are considering running for office or are otherwise engaged in influencing local decision-making) so that you are equipped with good data for the analysis of our reliance on our natural resources in this county and the responsibilities that reliance brings on us.

## GREEN PRODUCTS — CAN UUTC LIVE THE VALUES?

Once upon a time, in congregations across the land, great grumblings and discussions went forth as to which did more damage: running the dishwasher or using disposable products at coffee time. Many congregations, with fewer resources, opted for disposable products.



The battle about water use has long since passed, since manufacturing uses more water than modern dishwashers. UUTC has used china coffee cups for quite a long time. However, we also use plastic, single-use cups. We use (mostly) virgin-plastic trash bags. And frequently, when goods are purchased, we accept plastic bags to carry the purchases.

Your Social Action Team's work with the Better World Shopping Guide is enabling some changes. Joan Lemire, doing the shopping for the Coffee Team, is avoiding any of the companies who score lower than a "C" on their company practices, for instance. But to fully commit to the change, it takes congregational commitment. While "green" products have gotten consistently more competitive on price and quality, it still costs a bit more to choose high post-consumer waste products. As we move into pledge season, keep your vision of UUTC's values in mind. It is your commitment that powers our choices. Thanks!

## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT • JANUARY 2019

Dear Friends and Members,

The holidays have passed, leaving us time to catch our collective breaths and contemplate the next legs in our collective journey together as a part of this marvelous congregation.



While the Board did not meet in December, rest assured that plenty of activities focused on UUTC's future were progressing quite nicely.

The Council, as I've noted earlier, is making grand progress as it develops a Vision Statement for UUTC. Lead ably by Michael Solomon, this group, including Bruce Kirkman, Leigh Johnson, Carol Moore, Joyce Henneberry, Rev. Ilene and me, used the Mission Statement developed several years earlier as a springboard. A Vision Statement is an expression of what the church might look like in a period of three to five years, while the Mission Statement is a description of who we are – our values and aims. Expect to hear from the Board as we receive and then present this statement in the not too distant future.

The Finance Committee, a Board Committee, is hard at work on the budget for next year. This budget will be developed based on the needs described by the various Teams and Committees that provide the process backbone for UUTC.

The Nominations Committee, a Committee of the Congregation, is seeking to fill various leadership positions for UUTC for the budget year 2019 – 2020. At the risk of being redundant (you were forewarned!), I cannot emphasize how critical to the organizational success of UUTC its cadre of volunteers is. If you have gotten tired of seeing the same names and faces in the various leadership roles in the congregation, now is the time to speak up. Look at each Committee's and each Team's work and decide which best suits your interest and skill set. Let a member of the Team or Committee know of your interest. So many would welcome you with open arms!

**Finally, accompanying this note, is the agenda for the Board meeting next Tuesday, January 22.** Like virtually all meetings at UUTC (the exception is meetings in Executive Session, a rare occurrence), this meeting is open to Friends and Members. While you cannot vote on any motion that is put forward, you are welcome to voice your opinion.





## READY FOR THE UUTC COMMON READ?

*We are what we read.*

In discussions of this congregation on how to be a Welcoming Congregation—conversations that have sometimes been awkward, or anxious, or even angry—there have been honest questions about how we even talk to “those people,” what words are ok, etc. This is OK. This is how we sound when we don’t know the answers. Asking the questions is the first step. Understanding is the second.

To get understanding takes some study. We can’t always find out what it’s like living other people’s lives through direct questioning. This is when a good book is invaluable: it allows us inside someone else’s head, without being the least bit offensive.

“*There Will Be No Miracles Here*” was chosen in support of the 10th Anniversary of UUTC’s becoming a Welcoming Congregation and the necessary steps for renewal of that designation, which is no longer automatic. We must renew the process because the congregation is renewed constantly. How can those who have joined in the last 2 years know what we went through 10 years ago?

Thursday, January 31st at 4:00pm, is our first meeting to discuss this book. You will want to have finished at least half of the story in order to be ready to participate. It may be helpful to have selected some pieces of the text that had an emotional or visceral impact on you—those reactions indicate truth bombs.

If you have not already picked up this book at Highland Books, now would be the time!

## FEBRUARY 9 MARCH IN RALEIGH: MAKE CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER UUs

Join UUs from across North Carolina and Washington, D.C. in the 13<sup>th</sup> annual HKonJ Moral March and Peoples Assembly in Raleigh on February 9. HKonJ – **The Historic Thousands on Jones Street** – is made up of more than 125 NC NAACP branches, youth councils, college chapters and other social justice organizations. The group will demand that state lawmakers in North Carolina to "live the shape of justice" by protecting voting rights, expanding health care, supporting public education, respecting women's rights, preventing gun violence, protecting the environment, and caring for immigrants, the poor, people with disabilities, and senior citizens.



Unitarian Universalists (along with UU friends and allies) will gather between 8:00 and 9:30 am near the corner of South Street and Salisbury Street (look for the North Carolina Association of Educators sign) wearing yellow "Side With Love" or blue "UU Forward Together" t-shirts. After the pre-march rally (9:00 - 10:00), the group will march down Fayetteville Street to the old State Capitol building. Following the march, all are invited for lunch at the Christ the King Presbyterian Church (117 S. West Street, just a 5 1/2 block walk away) between 12:30 pm and 2:30 p.m. It's a great way to meet UUs from Washington and learn about upcoming social justice workshops and activities by the Unitarian Universalist Justice Ministry of North Carolina.
